The high-level segment will continue on Thursday, 9 December in Plenary Ceiba. Heads of State and Heads of Government are scheduled to make national statements first, followed by Ministers and Party representatives. The high-level segment will conclude on Friday, 10 December with statements by intergovernmental and non-governmental organizations and the adoption of decisions and conclusions by the COP and the CMP.

Speakers are asked to check the list of speakers to have an indication of when they will speak, as there may be changes in the order and day of speakers. All speakers are reminded that they should be present in the plenary at least ten minutes before (or two speakers ahead of) their presentation. Speakers are also reminded that statements made during the high-level segment should not exceed the **three-minute limit**, as decided by the Conference of the Parties at its first plenary meeting. Observer organisations are asked not to exceed a **two-minute limit**. Given the large number of statements, it is suggested that statements be as brief and concise as possible, with full texts available for distribution. If Parties do not wish to speak but would prefer to only have their statements circulated, the secretariat will make arrangements to distribute the copies and enter the statement in the records of the Conference. Parties interested in taking up this offer should communicate their interest to the External Relations team, who during the high level segment can be found in Plenary Ceiba. Any other changes to the speakers' list should also be brought to the attention of the External Relations team.

Parties are requested to note that the secretariat is not in a position to accommodate individual requests for changes in a Party's speaking slot. Parties wishing to make a change should arrange to exchange slots with another Party and jointly notify the secretariat of the agreement that has been reached.

The plenary is open for all Parties, observer States and observer organisations. The proceedings can also be followed on the CCTV screens throughout the Conference Center and on the stage screen at Cancunmesse.

All speakers are kindly requested to provide the Conference Officer with **20 copies** of their statements in advance to meet the needs of the interpreters and the Conference records. Parties wishing to have their statements distributed during the plenary meeting are requested to provide **300 copies**. These copies may be delivered to the Conference Officer's table located beside the podium in the plenary. Statements that are delivered during the high level segment and for which copies are provided to the secretariat, will also be available on the COP 16/CMP 6 website at unfccc.int/.
